Century Old Mystery Solved - Cher Ami

ABERDEEN PROVING GROUND, Md. – One of the enduring mysteries of the Signal Corps Pigeon Program, which was headquartered at Fort Monmouth, New Jersey, from 1919 until its discontinuation in 1957, was the history of the pigeon named Cher Ami, credited with saving the “Lost Battalion” during the October 1918 battles in the Argonne Forest in France, and later honored with the French Croix de Guerre with palm.
